3 Present: Ronnie Stevenson, Kerry Williams, Robert (Bob) Steed
4 Date: unknown

6 STEVENSON: Yeah, we're used to it. That's...ha...
7 STEED: You're used to not having a lot of light? Do they not take care of you guys?
8 STEVENSON: I've-I've worked my share graveyard shifts. So,
9 STEED: ha ha ha ha
10 STEVENSON: So, so I, I probably do better in the dark. Haha
11 STEED: I just read a study. Um, we do, we do a lot of health research here, I just read a study that
12 it's actually healthier for you to work during the day and sleep during the night.
13 STEVENSON: I heard that. Just recently they released that on the, they were saying that something about,
14 what's the, the, I don't know....
15 STEED: It's melatonin
16 STEVENSON: ...melatonin that,,
17 STEED: yeah...
18 STEVENSON: ...your body naturally produces. If you're a graveyard person, you're,
19 WILLIAMS: ...my sister-in-law doesn't worry about that cause she works, she's a graveyard nurse
20 STEED: oh yeah?
21 WILLIAMS: ...and has been for the last 12 years and
22 STEED: yeah...
23 WILLIAMS: works under fluorescent lights.
24 STEED: Well, I, wasn't going to tell you that the, what the down, what the downside risk is, but if
25 you've already read it, then you would have seen that they're linking this, this reduction in
26 melatin - - melanin production to, some cancers.
27 STEVENSON: ..good..
28 STEED: So, you guys try not to work at night,
29 WILLIAMS: ..haha..
30 STEVENSON: try to get your sleep.
31 WILLIAMS: I don't know if I can go back to graveyard, ha, I've done em'. I don't know if I could do that.
32 STEED: Well, I guess people were designed it to work at night.
33 STEVENSON: I, I know I don't function as well. They should make the switch easy. Course I'm not wanting
34 to stay. A lot of people stay on that graveyard schedule. I keep it on their days off. Not me.
35 WILLIAMS: uh-uh
36 STEPHENSON: ...just do the 26 hour day when I work and then go home and die for 12 hours, so,
37 STEED: eh, you guys do a good job
38 WILLIAMS: I think the latest I would stay up is like 11 on my days off. I'm still pretty normal.
39 STEVENSON: I tried to do that too.
40 STEED: Yeah. Well, anyway, so now you've had your health lessons for the day and
41 WILLIAMS: haha
42 STEVENSON: as I drink my coffee.
43 STEED: Hahahaha...Well, we can have a talk about that, if you want.
44 STEVENSON: Everything in moderation...
45 WILLIAMS: at least my donuts (inaudible – fitting?)
46 STEVENSON: ...that's my theory.
47 STEED: Haha, including coffee and moderation.
48 STEVENSON: ...I make my copy was seriously, half as strong as
49 STEED: like potent
50 STEVENSON: ...as my, like my mom comes and stays with me. We had to make two pots. Cause mine's
51 like tea...
52 STEED: ...one strong...and one weak...
53 WILLIAMS: My sister-in-law, the one from Sweden, she likes to chew her coffee.

54 WILLIAMS: ...I mean she likes it that thick...

55 STEED: All right, I'm going to tell you something about coffee and you are gonna really not like me.

56 They did a, they did a study over it, but you, I mean, you know, we're a nutrition company

57 right, so, I'm allowed. Um, they did a study. Actually, they, uh, conducted a study yet at uh,

58 BYU. They uh took cancer cells. They put them in petri dishes and they found that

59 whenever they added uh caffeine. So it wasn't, it wasn't related directly to, so, this really is

60 bad now, right?

61 STEVENSON: So, you poke and...

62 STEED: because now it extends to all this other stuff. But anyway, anytime they, they added

63 caffeine, the, the length of life of the cell was increased three times.

64 STEVENSON: Really?

65 WILLIAMS: Wow

66 STEED: Yeah. And that the, you know, what's interesting about that study is everyone has cancer

67 cells, right? But, but our immune system is, is, is pretty good at keeping them in check until

68 it becomes overwhelmed. And so what happens is you get these overwhelming events, you

69 know, maybe stress or maybe, you know, it can be induced by a lot of things, but obviously

70 the quicker that that killer T-cells can destroy cancer cells, the better off you are.

71 STEVENSON: Right

72 STEED: So you get to a certain point and then all of a sudden you've got, you know, some sort of a

73 tumor, a tumor or some sort of a growth that it's hard for the immune system to defend

74 against. And, so, eh, you want the life of that cancer cell to be as short as possible.

75 STEVENSON: Yeah.

76 STEED: And caffeine extends the life of those cells. I've heard

77 STEVENSON: I've heard sugar does too.

78 STEED: Yeah, sugar is just nasty. It's just nasty. Yeah.

79 WILLIAMS: haha

80 STEVENSON: and (inaudible – toot?) do those antioxidants in vitamin C so much

81 STEED: white death...I know you guys are like okay, enough said.

82 WILLIAMS: (laughter)

83 STEED: So that is so important. There's that power of attorney, by the way,

84 STEVENSON: okay

85 STEED: that works for that document

86 STEVENSON: Do we need a copy of this or does he already have one or?

87 STEED: I don't think you do need a copy, but I just, I, so that, you know, that's a signed

88 document...

89 STEVENSON: Yeah, Chris, Chris was very comfortable with that. Because I, you know, I told him I was

90 coming in and we didn't know if you're going to be here or not.

91 STEED: Yeah, he did see that, so, he was good to go.

92 STEVENSON: Yeah, we're good with that. And evidently, just in talking to different people, there was

93 some mention of a new investment or something that Ken was working on that had come

94 to light just prior to this whole event when he was killed. Do you know anything about

95 that?

96 STEED: a new investment?

97 STEVENSON: A new some, s ome, something that, even Janella said that he made a comment, oh, should

98 I invest a million dollars I don't know if I should or not. And just more of a general

99 statement that he made in passing, but just the timing we're just, again, looking at every

100 avenue, was there something new he was working on or something...

101 STEED: I can tell you about a couple of things that I would have known anecdotally. Uh, he, I just

102 wish he had a source that he'd have spoken more about some of the things he was doing.

103 Um, yeah, there's a couple of things. One is there was a property deal that was going on.

104 and there's two of those. And in fact, David Simpson is the partners, David sitting right out

105 here, I'm meeting with him next. He's the guy that, uh, he is the guy that would have been

106 working with him on that. There was a piece of property that was sold by a, or it's in the
107 process, Presidio group, P R E S I D E O Presidio, I guess.

108 STEED: Anyway, they sold a piece of property over here in Mapleton and, um, that's, that's one I
109 know that he was doing, I think he actually had 500,000 in that Dave has got a million in
110 it. Uh, they were looking to actually buy it and then turn it real fast.

111 STEVENSON um-hmm

112 STEED So that's one. The one, though, that I think I'm, I'm, that I would think is even more peculiar
113 is he was involved in a deal with a piece of property right over here off of the highway. And
114 he was going to be purchasing that property from, and this is another one that Dave said,
115 Dave Simpsons, a realtor that worked closely with Ken on a lot of projects. Have you guys
116 talked with Dave

117 STEVENSON I don't...I, not to my knowledge, but

118 STEED I know somebody has. He might be a person that you'd want to speak to, uh, concerning
119 that, but a-apparently I don't know how else it went down, but I do know that when I heard
120 it, I thought, wow, that's, there's at least some motive there. Ah, there was going to be a
121 sale of a piece of property and...

122 STEVENSON Here in Springfield?

123 STEED Yeah. This, this piece down here, um, and I won't know the details of this. I just know the
124 general's story cause he, Ken used to, he liked to hit home runs and then tell you about it.

125 STEVENSON uh-huh

126 STEED You know, he didn't, he didn't kind of like to tell you about things that were going on, but
127 it sounded to me like they had an opportunity to kind of cut a middleman out of a sale and,
128 uh, and increase their profits on on flipping some land. And you know, at the time, he just
129 said, well, you know, if they've found a way to kind of get to the wholesaler, you know, it's
130 one of those things, but it's, it's also one of those events that, uh you know, if, if uh, if you
131 were going to lose a million or \$2 million dollars on a deal, you know, I don't know how
132 much motivation a person needs to do something that bad, but, it, the thought crossed my
133 mind, you know, and I, I had asked, David Simpson, I said, is this a, in your estimation, is
134 this something that uh, you know, how shady were these guys and one of the guys he told
135 me about was a guy that uh, that works up at a place called Van Wagons Pawn Shop, who I
136 have to just thought forever was kind of a greasy guy. I don't think he's capable of doing
137 something like this, but apparently he's got a lot of skin in the game over here. But uh...

138 STEVENSON What's his name?

139 STEED ...on this piece. His name is uh, let's see, van Wagen...what's his? Norm, Norm van Wagon.
140 Yeah.

141 STEVENSON And he was involved in the deal?

142 STEED He was involved in his land deal. And supposedly he's one that that stood to lose some
143 money on it. And it's a big, convoluted deal. Springville went down and put a bunch of
144 money into this place. And I don't know, I don't know all the details, but I know that was
145 one of the last things that he was working on.

146 STEVENSON And it was that a million dollar investment? Do you know? On his part?

147 STEED It would be multi, multi-millions.

148 STEVENSON So, it wouldn't just be 1 million.

149 STEED It would be significant. Um, in fact, I think, I mean, they've, in fact they've through David
150 Simpson, they continue to want to pursue this, you know, because they want, they want
151 money to buy this land. And I just said, no, I just said, this is, I'm just not interested, you
152 know. But, I think the purchase price on the land is like 18 million. And there were people
153 that owned various pieces. And um, these were some of the people that I think stood to, to
154 lose. But you might talk with David. I wonder if he's...he's just stepped out. I wonder if he's
155 gone too far. I guess just, you know, it might be interesting to see. Yep, he out, probably
156 taking a call. Might be interesting to see if, if there's something there. I don't know, you
157 know? I know people don't like to lose money.

158 STEVENSON Yeah,

159 STEED Yeah, you know.
160 STEVENSON: So you don't know who he was working with or if he was meeting somebody. You just
161 don't know anything about that.
162 STEED: Well, I know you guys don't like theories. Um, I have thought all along that, it could have
163 easily dealt with, his just absolute tenacity, in regards to getting Dee getting her sentence
164 commuted. He was working so hard to do that, to get
165 STEVENSON: To get her released...How long has she been in?
166 STEED: She went in, in March of this year and she's scheduled for release in April. And, uh, he just
167 worked tirelessly. I mean, he just, it was just unending, you know, and there were so many
168 different avenues and, and, you know, one in particular avenue that I've really thought was
169 worthy of pursuit. And I don't know how much, or if they've even been able to put it
170 together, but uh, in, I think it was in April just after he went in, he was told that. and I think
171 I know, you know, the name of David Novak and you guys been able to find David Novak?
172 STEVENSON: I don't know, like I said, we've been pulled in, after the fact to do some of this leg work that
173 Chris and Dean have just not had time, you know, following things with any loose ends
174 they've sent us out.
175 STEED Okay
176 STEVENSON So, we haven't been involved in the main gist of the case. So, I'm not, we're kind of at a
177 disadvantage.
178 STEED: I think David Novak was a person of extreme interest to them initially. Ex-con guy that runs
179 a consulting service talks to people about what to expect in prison. He's written books,
180 hold seminars. But one of the things that he does is he tries various ways and means of
181 commuting sentences, everything from writing letters for presidential pardons to, activating
182 uh Senate involvement. Uh, he was working with, Warren Hatch and I know he'd sent him a
183 letter. But what was interesting about David Novak is he was actually working for both Tom
184 and Dee, and uh I think potentially that's where the rub is. You know, if, ha, you've gotten
185 to know the history of this family, it's pretty sordid and uh
186 STEVENSON It's very interesting.
187 STEED It's interesting. There's a lot of money involved. Uh, It's, it's sordid, and it's really ugly. And
188 we used to sit around and talk about the fact that it was possible that, that we could be
189 dealing with something like this someday. And you kind of say it tongue in cheek, but, um
190 then it happens. And you think, it makes you wonder why you didn't uh, makes you wonder
191 why you didn't take more precautions, you know? But anyway, David Novak, and we didn't
192 know it at the time, was working on behalf of Tom trying to get Tom's sentence commuted
193 and he was working on behalf of Dee. And he was taking a lot of money from both of them.
194 STEVENSON Was he trying to get Tom sentence commuted as well?
195 STEED Yeah.
196 STEVENSON Were they - their sentences similar?
197 STEED No, they were, they were sentenced the same day. They were indicted, convicted, and
198 sentenced all together. But the judge, Judge Kimball, who's the, the, the federal judge up
199 here. Um, he kind of hit Tom with more of the maximum sentence because he could see
200 that Tom was the ringleader and, and was the one that had really kind of taken them down
201 and then he gave Dee uh a relatively light sentence. And we really viewed that as his
202 acknowledgement that, uh that Dee was more of a battered spouse, which she was, you
203 know, she was a battered spouse for 30 years as one of those real tragic things. But
204 anyway, um certainly, certainly David Novak being the go-between would have expressed at
205 some point Dee's, Dee's plan, you know, and, and the plan was very simple. Ah, anything
206 that Dee knew or had that would either increase Tom's sentence, uh or would, would,
207 would hold up in court against Tom Jr. and Derek, uh the Fed's were really interested in
208 that. Uh, this gal, uh marks marks was it, I'm trying to remember the lead prosecutor, Caryn
209 mark, Caryn eh, I can't remember. Anyway, she, she was very interested in that information
210 and the deal was simple.
211

212 STEED: You bring us information that leads to a conviction, or at least leads to some major
213 indictments, especially on, on Tom Jr. and Derek. Remember, these are children, these are
214 children that had just really turned on her. They hated Ken. They had threatened Ken on
215 several occasions, more so Derek had threatened him physically. And, I know at one point,
216 one of the ranch hands saw Derek and Ken meet at the ranch and he was really nervous,
217 and he passed Ken, Ken passed Derrick, wad of cash that was in an envelope, and it was
218 about this thick. And, I know that when Dee heard that she was really upset. Because she
219 wanted to know where all her money was, you know? But, anyway, and that's uh why I
220 know initially there was uh some attention that was paid there. Ken's brother, Rob, first
221 thing he said is I uh Ken, I know Darick did this, I know Darick did. Cause there had been a
222 threat just within the last three weeks and other threats and Ken had taken it somewhat
223 seriously. He had, he put up significant surveillance at the house. He encouraged us to put
224 surveillance at our house through a company called Wilife, which we did, you know. So he,
225 he was concerned, you know. I don't think, I think like all of us, it was kind of a tongue in
226 cheek thing. But, but anyway, our big concern originally was that somehow this plan to
227 basically provide information to put these guys away, thus reducing D sentence had, had
228 gotten back to them. And if that's the case, it's, uh that certainly serves as made major
229 motivations because, you know Tom, Tom's narcissistic. He thinks everybody's wrong. He
230 thinks he shouldn't be there. Tom should be there. Tom broke the law. Tom tried to hide
231 this income from offshore. He tried to do it, you know, and he took Dee down with him and
232 he did conspire. And that's one of the charges he conspired with his attorney, James
233 Thompson, who also went to prison. That's all true.

234 STEVENSON Yeah

235 STEED You know, I mean, it happened; they got caught; they're doing their time. And it's
236 unfortunate that Dee was married to him and signing the tax returns. And that's the part
237 that uh, that throws Dee under the bus, you know?

238 STEVENSON Right.

239 STEED So it's a tragedy all the way around, but that that's one motivation. The other, the other
240 thing that happened is my brother, Darick, is going through a divorce. And, my mother
241 became very concerned with Darick and his activities and some of the things that he was
242 doing. And, and, he's apparently been taking some pretty hard drugs, uh which is really
243 unfortunate. That's not, that's not the house we were raised in, you know, but he, his kids
244 were seeing him take this foil packet out of his glove box while driving down the road. And
245 they saw him, snorting, these powders. And, he would say to them, you know, this, this
246 makes daddy strong. You know, of course they were mimicking him with some, some
247 something, they were doing some pixie sticks or something. And, so this all started to
248 come out. So, Cheris is her name. She went really aggressively against Darick because she
249 was really worried for the safety of her children as she shouldn't be. And uh, she, she didn't
250 have the money and Dee, caring about those grandchildren had, really kind of aligned
251 herself with Cheris and said, listen, I've been a battered wife for 30 years. I will help you.
252 Even though this is her son, she said, I will help you. And all, we give you the resources
253 that you need to feel safe and secure, which she did. And, and of course, as things play out,
254 Derek eventually found out that his own mother was supporting his, his estranged wife.
255 And he was very upset. And within about 30 days of that happening, Cheirs just completely
256 went off the radar. I mean, she just disappeared, stopped returning phone calls, fired her
257 attorneys, just stopped all the progresses. She had a, an effective restraining order in place
258 that went up in smoke.

259 STEVENSON And how long ago was this? This is...

260 STEED Well, it would have been, it's going back probably three or four months now. This is, and
261 this is Bart Bailey who is Dee's personal attorney. He has, is probably your best source of
262 truth regarding that. But uh, we really felt, and Dee really felt that she had either been
263 threatened beyond all imagination.

265 STEED: And of course, now we see possibly what these people are capable of, or, um she was paid
266 off
267 STEVENSON So maybe Cheris to somebody that needs to be talked to?
268 STEED Cherice needs to be talked to.
269 STEVENSON Do you have phone numbers on her or addresses or anything like that
270 STEED Uh, I never spoke to Cheris, but uh, Bart Bailey has uh, would have that information.
271 STEVENSON okay
272 STEED Yeah. He would have that. And you have Bart's information.
273 STEVENSON Yeah
274 WILLIAMS Would Cheris talk to us?
275 STEED You know, not freely, not freely she would be uh, and it really depends, you know, I mean, I
276 just really hope and pray that there is no involvement in that way, because that's something
277 that will continue to be a problem for (inaudible – my dad? - 10:34 - I can't tell).
278 STEVENSON She's continuing through the divorce with Darick?
279 STEED Well, we don't know
280 STEVENSON Because nobody's talking to her, she's still kind of removed herself from
281 STEED Yeah, we really don't know. We don't know if she's just frightened beyond all possibilities
282 and it's just kind of hold up. And, but we do know that she's not pursuing Darick anymore,
283 that we know and something happened. And, and, Ken actually had a letter that was
284 written in Tom Sr's handwriting, Tom Mower Sr's handwriting that said, we now have Cheris
285 back in our camp. He never showed me that letter, but uh, he had seen it. And uh, it was
286 this very, it's very intriguing to me because he had uh, for some reason, Dee and Ken was
287 both very interested in how Tom was doing and what Tom was doing. And, and, and I don't
288 know why. I just think that uh, they were really hoping that uh, his sentence would be
289 extended and that he would, you know, and I think it's a little bit of a vindictive thing. I
290 don't know. I just know that there's no, there's no love loss there. And yet Tom continues to
291 just love Dee, just loves her, you know.
292 STEVENSON: But he's now remarried, correct.
293 STEED: He's remarried, he's remarried this Russian gal. Um anyway, the other potential source of
294 truth that those guys would have had regarding our plan would have come from Cheris
295 potentially because she knew, she knew it all. I mean, we would sit around this in this
296 attorney's office. And we would talk about,
297 STEVENSON Trying to get ways of getting Dee's sentence commuted,
298 STEED: Correct with
299 STEVENSON: The right information, or whatever through the Feds
300 STEED: and Cheris was providing a lot of information. She was ju...you know, she was just newly
301 estranged she'd seen...
302 STEVENSON: ...on Dee's behalf. And then all of a sudden that stopped and she...
303 STEED: Correct
304 STEVENSON ...things change.
305 STEED we get this, you know, we get this letter or we hear about this letter,
306 STEVENSON: ...which makes you believe that Tom got to her and shut her down and
307 STEED Correct.
308 STEVENSON Okay. I, you know, you're talking to him kind of reading between the lines.
309 STEED: Yeah,
310 STEVENSON Okay.
311 STEED That's exactly. That's exactly it. And, and so that, you know, Ken is at the center point of all
312 of these activities, you know, he's the one that's running the money. He's the one that's
313 paying the attorneys. He's the one that's trying to find the dirt. He's the one that's
314 connecting the pieces. And uh, so my initial thought was indeed that, that somehow Tom
315 was involved in an effort to try to keep him from pursuing, you know, the sentence he was
316 pursuing. And uh, but you know, it's, it's pure speculation, you know, until, until something
317 comes up.

318 STEVENSON: How long was Tom sentence
319 STEED: Thirty-four months.
320 STEVENSON Okay.
321 STEED 34 months. But uh, he went into a drug rehab program and, it's scheduled to be out. I
322 think...
323 STEVENSON: Drug rehab for our prescription drugs to illegal drugs?
324 STEED: Yeah. It's kind of a funny, but they call it the RDAP, the R-DAP, the program. And uh, it's a,
325 it's a program run through whether the Federal Bureau of Prisons and basically it, it takes
326 about a year off your sentence.
327 STEVENSON Really. Did he have a drug problem?
328 STEED You know, um
329 STEVENSON Or is this just a way to get a year off your sentence?
330 STEED It is a way to get a year off your sentence but it does cover things like, well, I mean, it could
331 cover diet Coke
332 STEVENSON neh
333 STEED It's an addiction.
334 STEVENSON: So, if you had a prescription for Oxycontin, he could say it was addicted to it and use this
335 for a reduced sentence...
336 STEED correct. And Tom did, he did have some addictions. He had some addictions to uh
337 painkillers. I know that he was taking uh, he was taking an entire bottle of Excedrin every
338 day...
339 STEVENSON Okay
340 STEED ...and mini-pens, he was taking just some ridiculous amount of mini-pens and trying to
341 watch his weight,...
342 STEVENSON okay
343 STEED ...you know, and be an old hunk for all these 18 and 19 year old girls.
344 STEVENSON laughter
345 WILLIAMS laughter
346 STEED It's sick. It's the sickest dang thing.
347 STEVENSON: Is there anything else that has come to your mind that you want on record. Anything else
348 that, that uh, you can think of?
349 STEED: Yes, there is one other thing. Uh really don't know if this has any bearing, but it's worth
350 looking at uh, have you guys looked into a gentleman by the name of Robert Zmelic
351 STEVENSON: Don't know, but let me, you know, when they get back today, we can...
352 STEED: Okay
353 STEVENSON Robert, say it again.
354 STEED It's a, it's a, it's a Slovak, name it's Zmelic, Z M A E L I C
355 STEVENSON: Z M E L I C?
356 STEED: Z M E L I C, I think is how he pronounces it.
357 STEVENSON And what's the affiliation or?
358 STEED Zmelic, Zmelic was a good friend of uh Tom Sr's, Tom Jr's, and Darick's even through major
359 litigation, that we had with Neways. Um, they remained friends. I mean, here's a half of the
360 company being sued by this guy. And there, you know, behind, behind closed doors being
361 real chummy. And it was because they had done a lot of things in the Czech Republic that
362 were illegal and they'd gotten caught a couple of times because Robert Zmelic is a, he's
363 actually 1992 Decathalon Gold Medalist in Barcelona. He won the gold medal, the
364 Decathalon incorporates all the different...
365 STEVENSON What countries is he from?
366 STEED He's from the, he's from the Czech Republic.
367 STEVENSON Okay.
368 STEED Yeah. Slovakia or the Czech. I think he's from the Czech Republic.
369 STEVENSON Okay

370 STEED: Anyway, one of the, one of the more serious potential crimes that Tom has committed
371 involves Eastern Europe, and it involves, uh, income tax evasion and relabeling of old
372 product and just a lot of goofy things like that. And, uh, there is the outside chance that,
373 uh, there is the outside chance that, you know, Robert could have called. And I have to tell
374 you, the reason that I was thinking about this the other day is because we, we, we heard
375 the name, Robert. Robert certainly could be, you know, at fictitious name and most likely is,
376 but indeed Robert is somebody that, and, and this eye-witness, of course heard Ken say uh,
377 Robert, I don't want to have any troubles just as he was being shot. So, um, anyway, um...

378 STEVENSON: Does he live here local now or is he still out of the country or do you know?
379 STEED: He lives in the Czech Republic.
380 STEVENSON: But he would have a reason to come here if he's friends of Tom junior, senior, and Darick?
381 STEED: They're all still doing business together. I'm sure. His, his, Robert's good friend is working
382 here with Tom Jr. and Darick is...

383 STEVENSON What's his name? Robert Zmelic's good friend?
384 STEED Yes. What is his name? He was married to a gal by the name of Luba...Luba...and let's see.
385 What is his name? I'm trying to remember his name. Alan will probably know his name. I
386 can picture his face. Anyway, they continue to be good friends. And uh, the, the tie is that
387 certainly if Ken was looking to create uh, you know, ways and means of commuting the
388 sentence, one of the primary issues was related to Robert Zmelic and offshore accounts
389 and money that had been taken

390 STEVENSON As in getting Robert to give information against Tom?
391 STEED Uh yes, although, he wouldn't have done it willingly, but it was certainly an area of the
392 world where there was a lot of funny business going on and...

393 STEVENSON Okay
394 STEED ...therefore, investigators would be very interested in...

395 STEVENSON Have you had Robert Zmelic?
396 STEED Yeah, he and I used to be good friends.
397 STEVENSON Describe him to me. Give me a physical description.
398 STEED Uh, six foot two, blonde, well-built, blue eyes. And he's a good looking guy. He was a, he
399 was a world-class athlete, you know?

400 STEVENSON So, muscular guy, then
401 STEED muscular
402 STEVENSON He's six-two, then how much would you place his weight?
403 STEED Two... I guess he's gained weight actually, since he stopped competing actively. So
404 probably two-thirty.

405 STEVENSON Bout, how old do you have a date of birth or know how old he is?
406 STEED Let's see. He would be...

407 WILLIAMS We could google him, too.
408 STEED Oh, yeah. In fact, I Googled him, when I first started thinking about this last week and it was
409 some information that came up. He comes up first. Do you remember Robert Zmelic's
410 friend that worked at Neways?

411 ALAN Edward Vosar?
412 STEED Edward Vosar, was he from Slovakia?
413 ALAN I don't know for sure.
414 STEED He was either from Slovak or from Czech Republic. And he's still working here local. Isn't
415 he?
416 ALAN Last I heard.
417 STEVENSON How do you spell Vosar?
418 STEED V O S A R is it?
419 ALAN It's A R. I couldn't remember whether it's S or Z. But I think it's S.
420 STEED I think it's S. And then, do you remember Luba's name. I know it's a real heavy Slovak name
421 ALAN I think it starts with a Y and it goes on for a long time.
422 STEVENSON hahaha

423 ALAN other than that?
424 WILLIAMS Lots of syllables
425 STEED Luba and Edward are married, so they're both working for Sisel.
426 STEVENSON Okay.
427 ALAN Last I heard
428 STEVENSON And Edward's a friend of Zmelic's.
429 STEED Yeah. He was his personal trainer.
430 STEVENSON So, is Zmelic 40, 30, 20?
431 STEED Zmelic would beeeeeeeee...40
432 ALAN 'Bout 40. 45
433 STEED Yeah, I think so.
434 STEVENSON: Okay. All right. Anything else?
435 STEED: I think that's about it. Thanks, Alan. I appreciate that. I knew you'd know. So, is he's an
436 attorney here on staff.
437 STEVENSON: And so when you heard the name of Robert being mentioned, you did think of this guy just
438 as a connection or something?
439 STEED: Yeah. You know, I hate to send you guys off on some wild thing, but, I, you know, I don't
440 know. I guess it's worth mentioning. I don't know, but uh, certainly if Cheris has not been
441 spoken to, she should be spoken to.
442 STEVENSON: Okay. Well, what we'll do is get some information from Bart and try and make contact with
443 her. She lived here local?
444 STEED: She was up in the midway. So she's up by Hebron, not too far around the mountain from
445 you guys there.
446 STEVENSON: Okay. All right. Well, we will take care of that and we appreciate your time. And should we
447 talk to David? Is it we're talking to David today?
448 STEED: Well, you know, you probably should. He is still here. It's that his car? No, but he is still
449 here. He's wandering around outside. You probably ought to take just a minute with him.
450 STEVENSON Okay
451 STEED I gotta get running.
